

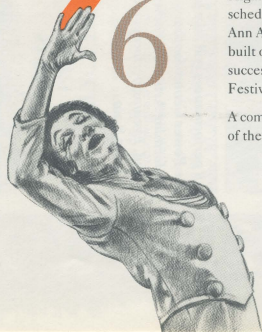

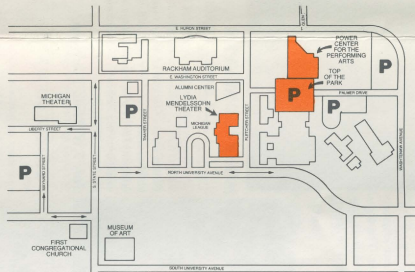

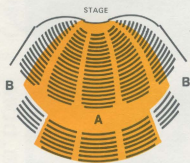
NORTH, VIA US-23: to Business Route M-14 Main Street. Main to Huron, left on Huron to the theater area at Fletcher St.

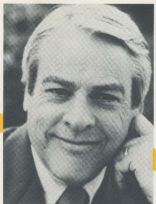
South Africa's MARKET THEATRE COMPANY IN ASINAMALI

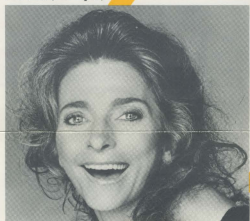

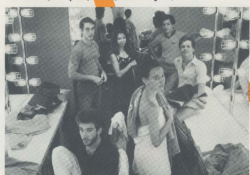
