









The River in Reverse Tour

'The River in Reverse,' Elvis Costello & Allen Toussaint's spirited and deeply soulful new album - seven songs from Toussaint's remarkable catalog: five newly written by the two: and one new song, the title track, written by Costello - was released June 6 by

Sessions for the album took place over a whirtwind two weeks late last year in Hollywood, CA and at Piety Street Studios in Toussaint's hometown of New Orleans

Produced by Joe Henry, the album masterfully combines Costello's band The Imposters with Toussaint's horn section (Amadee Castenell, Joe Smith, Sam Williams and Brian Cavolle) and guitarist (Anthony Brown).

Toussaint led the ensemble from the piano, with Imposters keyboard player Steve Nieve switching to Hammond B3. The majority of the tracks were cut with the entire group in the room and Costello singing live, occasionally adding his quitar to the mix. Costello selected songs from deep within the Toussaint catalogue such as "Nearer To You." "Freedom For The Stallion" and "Tears Tears and More Tears," Toussaint kicks off the lead vocal on his composition. "Who's Gonna Help Brother Get Further?" and trades vocal lines with Costello and bassist Davey Farapher on several other tracks.

All of the horn arrangements are marked with Toussaint's distinctive style and, commented Costello, "add a second voice" to the title track, the one song that Costello wrote alone. Just before the recording began, the due holed up in New York to write together throughout October, a quick-moving process that resulted in four songs on the album of various combinations of words and music. The songwriting collaboration began with Costello writing lyrics for Toussaint's beautiful minor key variation of Professor

Longhair's "Tipitina." The resulting piece is now entitled "Ascension Day." Other new titles include "The Sharpest Thorn." "Broken Promise Land" and "International Echo."

Toussaint previously produced a 1983 Costello cover of Yoko Ono's "Walking on Thin Ice" with the Attractions and The T.K.O. Horns, and also contributed piano to the New Orleans-recorded "Deen Dark Truthful Mirror" from Costello's 1989 album 'Soike."

Immediately following Hurricane Katrina, Toussaint relocated to New York City where the two renewed their musical friendship at several benefit concerts and club cigs during a seven day period from the 17th of September, leading to discussions of this new album. The powerful song "The River in Reverse" was written by Costello on September 24th, 2005, and performed by him for the first time at that night's "Parting the Waters" benefit event organ-

Since working together on the album, Costello & Toussaint have delivered knockout performances at the Grammy Awards in Los Angeles in February and the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame induction ceremony in New York City in March

"JUNGLE JACK" HANNA

ack Hanna, popular host of the hit television series. Jack Henna's Animal Adventures, is one of America's most beloved naturalists and adventurers. Each week, Hanna takes millions of family viewers on exciting journeys to learn about animals and the places they live. What makes the series a success to a broad segment of viewers is Hanna's enthusiasm and wonderment with every new creature and experience he encounters. No intellectual pomp or indifference here. Jack Hanna is "every

Hanna began to receive national attention after he became Director of the rundown Columbus Zoo in Columbus, Ohio in 1978 He not only transformed the zoo into a model facility, but through his media savvy, made the Columbus Zoo a household name. He is a regular quest on shows including Good Morning America. Larry King Live, The Late Show With David Lettermen, Hollywood Sources and The Meury Povich Show. He also makes countless personal appearances and speeches throughout the U.S.

The route to becoming a national celebrity began in his family's bathtub in Knoxville. Tennessee where he raised bluepills and then extended his menagerie to their backyard. After majoring in business in college, Hanna, with support from his wife. Suzi. started a pet shop and petting zoo, worked for a wildlife adventure company and directed a small Florida zoo. The couple's subsequent move to Columbus (with their three daughters) was the start of Hanna's rising media star. Not only was he a regular on national talk shows, his autobiographical book. Monkeys on the

Interstate, was a hit in 1989. Other books, including one for children, Let's Go To The Petting Zoo With Jungle Jack, followed.

The natural progression for someone with Hanna's knowledge of animals and the wild, along with his media popularity was to have his own show, Jack Hanna's Animal Adventures. It now reaches in over 60 countries worldwide. Director Emeritus of the Columbus Zoo since 1993, he still remains active in the zoo and

Jack Hanna is a Professional Fellow of the American Zoo & Aquarium Association and a member of the Explorer's Club. He is also an active supporter of Easter Seals and the Leukemia Society and serves on the boards of several educational institutions. While he takes all of his civic responsibilities seriously, he maintains that wildlife conservation is his true calling

he Preservation Hall Jazz Band derives its name from Preservation Hall, the venerable music venue located in the trements strictly welcoming people of all ages interested in havheart of New Orleans' French Quarter, founded in 1961 by Allan and Sandra Jaffe. The band has traveled worldwide spreading their mission to nurture and perpetuate the art form of New Orleans Jazz, Whether performing at Carnegie Hall or Lincoln. Center, for British Royalty or the King of Thailand, this music embodies a joyful, timeless spirit. Under the auspices of current director, Ben Jaffe, the son of founders Allen and Sendra, Preservation Hall continues with a deep reverence and consciousness of its greatest attributes in the modern day as a venue, band, and record label.

The building that houses Preservation Hall has housed many businesses over the years including a tayern during the war of 1812, a photo studio and an art callery. It was during the years of

the art gallery that then owner, Larry Bornstein, began holding informal iam sessions for his close friends. Dut of these sessions grew the concept of Preservation Hall. The intimate venue, whose weathered exterior has been untouched over its history, is a living embodiment of its original vision. To this day, Preservation Hall has no drinks, air conditioning, or other typical accouing one of the last pure music experiences left on the earth.

The PHJB began touring in 1963 and for many years there were Hall. Many of the band's charter members performed with the pioneers who invented jazz in the early twentieth century including Buddy Bolden, Jelly Roll Morton, Louis Armstrong, and Bunk Johnson. Rand leaders over the hand's history include the brothers Willie and Percy Humphrey, husband and wife Billie and De De Pierce, and famed pianist Sweet Emma Barrett. These founding artists and dozens of others passed on the lessons of their music to a younger generation who now follow in their footstens. like current band leader and trumpeter John Brunious. Their debut album on that label - Arroz. con Mango - was both a tribute to the deep Cuban roots of Tiempo Libre's members and a celebration of their new life in the US Released to universally glowing reviews, Arroz con Mango received tremendous attention in the press and was featured in numerous national publications including Latin Beat, Hispanic

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


Megazine, Jazziz and American Airlines' American Way Magazine They performed songs from the new album on many of Miami's highest-rated Spanish-language shows, on WNJU-Telemundo in the New York area, on Chicago's WGN-TV and they were featured in a nationally-aired radio interview by Maria Hingiosa on NPR's Lating USA. B om in Buffalo, New York, Untranco was side enough to drive. As a teenager, the poems she'd been writing in "long skinny columns" soon evolved into lyrics, and music became a way for the teenager to talk about the things that mattered most to her: the power dynamics of remantic entanglements, the fragmentation of her family, the choices she watched her friends making, and the state of life in her hometown and her country

The early 1990s brought a temporary relocation to New York and classes in poetry and politics at the New School but her real education came on weekends, as she hit the road with increasing frequency and growing confidence, developing her signature percussive finger picking and dynamic range in order to grab and hold the attention of policy har crowds. Even the need to fill time. while re-tuning became an opportunity to improvise off-the-cuff stories about whatever had happened during the gourse of her day, which became yet another hallmark of her style. After just about every one of her funny, outspoken, intimate gigs, she'd leave behind a fresh batch of converts eager to spread the word to everyone they knew, via cassettes at first and then CDs. Rather than waiting for some ASR bigwig to sign her. An simply created her own record label, Righteous Babe, eventually turning down unpredictable as hers. legions of potential deals when she realized they had nothing to

offer that she couldn't provide herself. In the process, the born performer began to learn her way around the recording studio, too, gradually developing her own innovative means to convey the spontaneity, intensity and wit of her live concerts on disc.

Nearly a decade and a half of hard work, glowing word of mouth. and relentless touring later, the self-described "Little Folksinger" is packing joints like Carnegie Hall and amphitheaters around the makes each venue she

plays feel as cozy as a living room and as sweaty That DIY label of hers, still based in Buffalo (with a London), has now released 16 of Ani's own CDs and about a dozen more by an eclectic hand-picked roster

MICHAEL FEINSTEIN

M ichael Feinstein, one of the premier interpreters of American popular song, has been a household name since the success of his 1988 one-man Broadway show. Isn't It Romantic. He enjoys an active performance calendar, including major concert halls, symphony orchestras, intimate jazz clubs. and college campuses. More than a mere performer, he is nation ally recognized for his commitment to the American popular song, both celebrating its art and preserving its legacy for the next generation.

Feinstein has spent his entire adult life chronicling, cataloging. ters, tending to sidestep bigger names like Porter and Berlin in favor of less-heralded geniuses. Feinstein combines hits and rarities to create the equivalent of a musical biography, in the process often unearthing gems that might otherwise have been forever lost. His past subjects have included a stellar troupe of composers, from Jule Styne, Jerry Herman, Hugh Martin, and Jimmy Webb to Burton Lane, Jay Livingston, and Ray Evans.

In 1998 Feinstein begame a Concord Records artist, where he has recorded Michael and George Fainstein Sings Garshwin, Rin Clay Abythms (with the Maynard Ferguson Big Band), the double-CD Romance on Film, Romance on Broadway, and Michael Feinstein with the Israel Philhermonic Grobestre.

His own record label, Feinery, a new Concord subsidiary, released The Livingston and Evans Sonobook, featuring Feinstein and special guest Melissa Manchester. In 2006, they released Doris Day's "The Love Album," the first U.S. release of the 1967 recordings enhanced by three live selections taken from her 1971 TV Special. Michael's Manhattan nightclub, Feinstein's at the Regency, has pre-

sented the top talents of pop and lazz, including Rosemary Clooners. Steve Tyrell Rarbara Cook, Tony Danza, Ann Hameton Colloway. and Dame Cleo Laine, Michael appears there for a sold-out holiday

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engagement every year. Last fall he completed a sold-out two week engagement at the Theatre Royal Haymarket in London's West End.

Michael started playing piano by ear when he was five. As a teenager, he played at weddings and parties in Columbus, Ohio. After graduating from high school, he worked in local piano lounges for two years, moving to Los Angeles when he was 20. Through the widow of legendary concert planist-actor Oscar Levant, he was introduced to Ira Gershwin in July 1977. Feinstein became Gershwin's assistant for six years, granting him access to numerous unpublished Gershwin songs, which he has since

Gerstwin's influence provided a solid base upon which Michael has not only evolved into a cantivating performer composer and erranger of his own original music, but has also become an unparalleled interpreter of music legends such as Irving Berlin. Jerome Kern, Johnny Mercer, Duke Ellington, and Harry Warren. Through his live performances (from Hollswood Royal to Carnenie

Halfi, recordings, film, and television appearances, and his songwriting (in collaboration with Alan and Marilyn Bergman, Lindy Robbins, and Carole Bayer Sager). Michael has been an important musical force during the past 15 years. In addition, he scored the original music for the film Get Rouge. His television credits include performances on Carolina in the City Malrone Place, Couch and Outy The Library of Congress elected Michael to the exclusive

National Sound Recording Advisory Board. He and other industry leaders recently met in Washington, DC, for a forum on safeguarding America's musical heritage. The Steps have been featured on three national specials for public television, "Good Moming, America," "Entertainment Toninht," "Nightline," 'The Today Show," '20/20," "CBS Morning News," "ABC's World News Tonight," "NBC Nightly News," and dozens of times on National Public Radio's "All Things Considered," They currently produce four quarterly specials for public radio stations. nationwide, and they've been regularly featured on CNN's 'Inside Politics."

The group was formed in December, 1981 when three staffers for Senator Charles Percy were asked to provide entertainment for the Senate Foreign Relations Committee Christmas party. At first. the group considered staging a traditional nativity play, but in all

Says Elaina Newport, co-founder and performer, "Typically the Republicans goof up, and the Democrats party. Then the Democrats goof up, and the Republicans party. That's what we call the two-party system."

Whether it's a performance for the National Welding Supply Association, a University audience, or State Legislators, audiences love to laugh at political pokes at public figures. The only complaints they get are from politicians and personalities who are not included in the program!

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



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AN EVENING WITH JOHN WATERS

Friday, July 7, 8pm Power Center

B orn in Baltimore, MD in 1946, John Waters was drawn to movies at an early see, particularly exploitation movies with lurid ad campaigns. He subscribed to Variety at the age of twelve, absorbing the magazine's factual information and its lexicon of insider lingo. This early education would prove useful as the future director began his career giving puppet shows for children's birthday parties. As a teenager, Waters began making 8mm underground movies influenced by the likes of Jean-Luc Godard, Walt Disney, Andy Warhol, Russ Meyer, Ingmar Bergman and Hershall Gordon Lewis.

Using Baltimore, which he fondly dubbed the "Hairdo Capitol of the World", as the setting for all his films, Waters assembled a cast of ensemble players, mostly native Baltimoreans and friends on long standing: Divine, David Lochary, Mary Vivian Pearce, Mink Stole and Edith Massey. Waters also established lasting relationships with key production people, such as production designer Vincent Peranin, costume designer Van Smith and casting director Pat Moran, helping to give his films that trademark John Waters "look."

Waters made his first film, a 8-mm short. Hag in a Black Leather Jacket in 1964, followed with Roman Candles in 1966, the first of his films to star Divine and Mink Stole. In 1967, he made his first 16-mm film Eat Your Makeup, the story of a deranged governess and her lover who kidnan fashion models and force them to model. themselves to death. Mondo Trasho. Waters first feature length film was completed in 1969. In 1970 Waters completed what he described as his first 'celluloid atrocity'. Multiple Maniacs. In 1972 Waters created what would become the most notorious film in the American independent cinema of the 1970s. Pink Flamingos. the ultimate trash masterpiece. Waters borrowed the money to make Plok Flamingos from his mom and dad, but forbid them from

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ever seeing it. In 1981 Waters completed Polyester - filmed in plorious "odorama," ticket buyers were given scratch in sniff cards that allowed the audience to smell along with the characters in their fragrant search for romantic happiness. Waters is also the Director's Cut, and Art: A Sex Book.

Since the 1970s in the early stages of his career, Waters was inspired by necessity to develop his live performance skills. When he didn't have distribution for his films and was forced to rent theaters himself to screen his works, he and his leading lady Divine would appear and concoct outrageous skits to make the evenings more memorable. Thirty years later, Waters has gained success as a director, as a noted author of multiple books, a visual artist, actor, lecturer and emcee.

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

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
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
